The **REGULAR MEETING** of the East Grand Rapids Public Schools Board of Education, Kent County, Michigan, was held on Monday, October 23, 2017, in the High School Little Auditorium, 2211 Lake Drive SE, East Grand Rapids, MI 49506.

President Wolford called the meeting to order at 6:00 p.m.

#### **Acknowledgment of Guests - None**

#### **Board Secretary's Report: Communications to and from the Board**

The board received communication from Angela Walters, on behalf of herself and several community members as listed in her letter, on racism education in our schools.

#### **Student Council President's Report**

Tomer Andegeko, Student Council President, reported that recent Homecoming activities were successful and students worked together to organize Spirit Week, the dance, and the parade. Student Council partnered with the Key Club to raise funds for Hurricane Harvey Relief, specifically in support of Bellaire High School in Houston, Texas. Veteran's Day activities are being organized for November.

Member Milanowski arrived at 6:04 p.m.

#### **PRESENTATION / DISCUSSION ITEMS**

##### **Recognition of National Merit Semi-Finalists** (Enclosure #5)

Lori Johnston and Craig Weigel recognized Madeline Meyer, Leo Schneider, James Van Dokkumburg, and Sara Vargo on their accomplishments in becoming a National Merit Semi-Finalist. These students were congratulated by the board and presented with a certificate of recognition.

##### **Diversity Presentation** – Enclosure #6

Jenny Fee, Assistant Superintendent of Instruction; Anthony Morey, Middle School Principal; and Carlye Allen, Wealthy Elementary Principal, shared an in-depth presentation on diversity education in our schools. Fee described the district's mission, learner outcomes, and our Strategic Plan which reflects our beliefs. She reported that the district's mission drives our curriculum and goals. Fee reported on the district's Cross-Cultural Competency Standards (CCC) taught K-12. She provided examples of the diversity in our curriculum throughout the district in various subjects.

Carlye Allen presented on the elementary building initiatives, shared building level themes, building level diversity teams, and lessons with the school social worker. Community partnerships, service learning opportunities, author and artist visits, Spanish curriculum, Mix It Up opportunities, and purposeful read alouds were described.

Anthony Morey presented on the middle school and high school building initiatives. He explained that there is no greater topic of importance and our teachers understand our work, which is very teacher-driven and teacher-led. Morey described the district's Champions of Diversity committee which includes a dedicated team of teachers and teacher leaders who regularly meet on diversity topics. He shared the goals of departmental leadership. Morey reported on the LINKS Program at the secondary level which involves all students in service learning projects. Student clubs and activities were described. Information on student leadership opportunities was shared.

Fee reported on districtwide efforts on supporting diversity initiatives. Examples of staff development on diversity training were shared including GRCC's Institute for Healing Racism in which 87% of our district staff has been trained, implicit bias training through Grand Rapids Urban League, Restorative Justice training, International Baccalaureate training, and hiring practices. Fee explained the district's commitment to developing cultural competence of staff and students, fostering cultural inclusiveness, and being culturally responsive. Examples of opportunities for parent-school-community partnerships were provided. A discussion was held among the board.

Acceptance of 2016-2017 Audit Report – Kevin Philipps (Enclosure #11)

**Background:** The audit was completed by Maner Costerisan this fall. The Board Finance Committee reviewed the report and recommends that the Board of Education receive the 2016-2017 Audit Report.

**Recommendation:** Motion to receive the 2016-2017 Audit Report as presented and recommended by the Board Finance Committee and Superintendent.

Kevin Philipps, Assistant Superintendent of Business, presented the findings of the 2016-2017 Audit Report. He shared that Bruce Dunn from Maner Costerisan reported audit results to the Finance Committee last week. Overall results reflected the highest opinion in that the financial statements present fairly, in all material respects, the respective financial position of the governmental activities. Dunn acknowledged the district for continuing to run smoothly with such a limited staff and appreciated the continued transparency of administrative staff while working with the district. Philipps commended the business office staff for their work all year long in accomplishing tasks that led to a positive audit.

Member Milanowski returned at 8:01 p.m.

Member Hessler moved to accept the 2016-2017 Audit Report as presented and recommended by the Board Finance Committee and Superintendent. Member Bernecker seconded the motion. A discussion was held among the board. The Board commended Philipps on his leadership in the Business Office. Motion passed 7-0.

Approval of Proposed Amended Budget for 2017-2018 – Kevin Philipps (Enclosure #12)

Kevin Philipps provided an overview of the Proposed 2017-2018 Amended Budget. He provided a summary of changes since the June 2017 Adopted Budget, an analysis of future years' budget assumptions, the budget forecast for 2018-2019 and 2019-2020, as well as financial trends/ratios, and areas of importance in the next few years. A discussion was held among the board.

Subject: Proposed two-year contract extension with the East Grand Rapids Education Association

The administration has been in discussions with the East Grand Rapids Education Association (EGREA) over the past couple of months to extend the current 2015-2018 contract that is due to expire on June 30, 2018. We are pleased to bring forward a tentative agreement the administration has reached with the EGREA to extend the contract two-years through June 30, 2020, for Board of Education consideration. The EGREA ratified the tentative agreement on Thursday, November 30, 2017. The details of the tentative two-year agreement are provided below:

**Salary:**

- **2017-2018:**
  - Eligible employees will receive a step increase in lieu of the current 2015-2018 compensation formula being applied.
- **2018-2019 and 2019-2020:**
  - The current compensation formula will be continued for two-years through June 30, 2020, with the following addition(s):
    - 100% of the Kent County enhancement millage revenue will be included in the compensation formula calculation starting with the 2018-2019 school year.
    - Employees who receive an Ineffective evaluation performance rating in 2017-2018 or 2018-2019 shall not receive any increases based on the compensation formula.

**Health Insurance:**

- **2017-2018:**
  - Beginning January 1, 2018, the district will offer a second option of MESSA medical care
    - (\$1,350/\$2,700 high deductible plan, 10% coinsurance after the deductible up to additional \$2,000 out of pocket)
- **2018-2019**
  - The district and EGREA agree to offer a 3<sup>rd</sup> and/or 4<sup>th</sup> option to MESSA medical care to reduce employees' out of pocket costs.

**Calendar:**

- First day of school for students will be Monday, August 20, 2018, for the 2018-2019 school year
- First day of school for students will be Monday, August 19, 2019, for the 2019-2020 school year *as long as the Kent County waiver to start school prior to Labor Day is still applicable.*

**Early Resignation Incentive:**

- Eligible employees represented by the EGREA will be offered an Early Resignation Incentive Plan (ERI) effective June 30, 2018.
- A minimum of 10 eligible employees must elect to participate in the ERI or the plan will be null and void.
- The benefit will be \$45,000, paid in three (3) annual installments of \$15,000 each starting January 2019.

We believe this is a fair settlement for the district and EGREA based on the current economic situation. Granting a step increase for this school year and continuing the compensation formula for the next two school years provides EGREA bargaining unit employees an opportunity to see potential further increases in salary while maintaining the district's financial stability. The additional MESSA medical care options will provide employees greater flexibility to manage the costs of their health benefits while maintaining excellent coverage. We were pleased to reach an extension to the current agreement that recognizes the efforts of our teaching staff while striving to contain our district costs so that academic excellence is maintained in the East Grand Rapids Public Schools.

**Opposition to Senate Bills 584-586 and 366  
Board of Education Resolution**

**WHEREAS**, a public school district is tasked with providing for the safety and welfare of its students and to educate students in a safe and nurturing environment.

**Whereas**, in *Michigan Gun Owners, Inc. v Ann Arbor Public Schools* (318 Mich App 338 (2016)) and *Michigan Open Carry v Clio Area School District* (318 Mich App 356 (2016)), the Michigan Court of Appeals found that school districts have the authority to promulgate policies that ban the possession of firearms on school property and at school-sponsored events; and

**Whereas**, Senate Bill 584 would allow an individual with a Concealed Pistol License to request a special endorsement to carry a concealed firearm into no-carry zones, such as schools, day cares and stadiums with only a minimal amount of additional training; and

**Whereas**, Senate Bill 586 would prohibit local Board of Education decisions on whether or not to allow weapons on school property by amending Public Act 319 of 1990 to include a school district, community college district and public library in the list of public entities that are prohibited from enacting firearm regulations stricter than any federal or state law; and

**Whereas**, Senate Bill 366 would create a concealed pistol license for people ages 18-21, instead of the current law that does not allow concealed carry for anyone under the age of 21; and

**Whereas**, SB 584 also bans the open carry of firearms in pistol-free zones to address the disruption this has caused in schools, this bill is being sold as a compromise to the "open carry issue," however, it is not a compromise that the education community supports; and

**Whereas**, our concerns are focused on the safety of our students, staff and others visiting our campuses. Allowing more guns in schools is not a solution and places more people in harm's way, including our students. Moving to a concealed carry system only hides the danger of a gun on campus; and

**Whereas**, SB 586 would not allow a district to set policies regarding firearms except for their own students and staff, this would not cover visiting students or staff for extracurriculars or those who participate in shared time programs; and

**Whereas**, even with the most well-intentioned individual, accidents happen. With more guns in schools we are fearful of mistakes that could put the 1.5 million students that walk the halls of our K-12 buildings every day without incident in unnecessary danger. This is too big a risk to take with their lives; and

**Whereas**, we have seen tragic shootings over recent years and even weeks in and around schools, nothing in this legislation will bring these incidents to an end nor will it create safer schools; and

**Whereas**, having armed citizens in our schools will likely increase emergency response times. It will hinder the ability of law enforcement to quickly take charge of a situation because they would first have to identify who is a licensed CPL holder and who is the active shooter; and

**Whereas** any weapon on school property can disrupt the educational process for the school community and a 2015 EPIC/MRA poll showed that a majority, 57%, of the general public opposed concealed carry in schools; and

**Whereas** the **Board of Education of East Grand Rapids Public Schools** believe the only people that should have guns on school property should be sworn law enforcement officers;

**Now, therefore be it resolved that the Board of Education of East Grand Rapids Public Schools opposes Senate Bills 584-586 and 366** and urges lawmakers and the Governor to allow local school boards to enact their own policies regarding weapons on school grounds; and

**Be it further resolved that** copies of this resolution be sent to Gov. Rick Snyder and the district's State Representatives and Senators.
